Additionally, as a college professor, I see on a daily basis that the most employable students are those that have met these goals – treating others with respect, communicating well, demonstrating a capacity to work hard, etc. These students get jobs well before a student with only a high GPA. But, then again, most students with those critical skills have high academic achievement as well.
